Women assaulted on Pearl Ct.

Police report that two out-of-town women (one from Brampton, the other from Guelph) were assaulted by a Brampton man at a Pearl Court home (near Acton High) on Sunday.

Pomeroy's legal tab might not be picked up by taxpayers

Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette wants Halton Chairman Peter Pomeroy to dig deep into his own pockets — not those of taxpayers — to pay the legal bills stemming from breach of trust and bribery charges.

Attoday's (Wednesday) Halton Council meeting, a move will be made to re-open debate on a re-Pomeroy is using in his attempt to have the Region pay his legal bills.

To date, staff have released \$28,800 to Pomeroy, a move that has angered many Halton Councillors, who insist the by-law was not designed to help pay legal fees incurred from criminal charges.

Councillor Bonnette blames regional staff for the situation and insists Council only intended to cover legal expenses incurred in defending themselves against civil suits resulting from actions taken while doing their jobs.

"If staff were going to pay Peter (Pomeroy) any money they should

have had a report to Council saying that he was applying for some money under the by-law," Bonnette said on Monday.

"There's no way, shape or form that staff should have cut him a cheque without even reporting to Council. If there was any question about interpretation, staff should have brought it to council for clarification," Bonnette argued.

Regional staff said that the bycently approved by-law that law does specifically cover those charged with criminal offenses relating to their elected duties and there is no requirement that Council be informed if someone applies for and is granted compensation.

Bonnette said that if Council decides Pomeroy's legal costs are covered by the by-law, the Region should at least have some security to ensure it can recover the money if Pomeroy is found guilty.

Pomeroy will stand trial on breach of trust and bribery charges in the new year.

He has proclaimed his innocence and intends to seek re-election as Regional Chairman.
