Miss Acton Fairs look back

The Acton Ambassador Pageant (formerly Miss Acton Fall Fair) has been accused of being outdated and sexist, contributing only to the image of women as objects.

In an effort to demonstrate that the pageant is more than a showcase, former winners have shared their thoughts about their experience representing Acton and how it changed to their lives.

The following comments certainly support the argument that the honour of representing this community has always gone well beyond the scope of any "beauty contest."

Brenda Hillier (Spear) Miss Acton 1967

If my memory serves, I was the youngest contestant (15) that year. As I looked around at the other contestants — older, mature and very pretty — I never dreamed of winning, just having fun and getting a free wallet. But I did win, much to my surprise and shock!

The year I won was Canada's Centennial year, so it was a challenging and busy time for me. With meetings, suppers and fairs to attend as Miss Acton, it was a great privilege for me to represent Acton that year and to still be involved with the Fair, as I am now.

Linda Robson (Thomson) Miss Acton 1984

Being Miss Acton was one of the most exciting times of my life. Not only did it give me the opportunity

to learn more about Acton and about the role of agriculture in Acton and in Canada, but it also introduced me to some of the most exceptional people I have ever met.

One of my favourite memories was during the dance that was held on our second night at the CNE convention. A group of us decided to get up and dance and it turned into a snowball, where we were pulling other fair queens onto the floor. Within minutes all you could see were tiaras and sashes. It didn't take the society members long to join in and we all stayed up dancing until late that night.

One of the hardest parts of being Miss Acton was that whenever I attended a function someone would hand me a microphone and ask me to say a few words. I knew virtually nothing about agriculture, but with the help of the Agricultural Society I learned quickly.

Even though I still get nervous when I have to stand up and speak in front of a group, this experience has given me the confidence to represent myself in a professional and intelligent manner. Miss Acton gave me my time in the spotlight and I am a more confident and self-assured person because of it.

The feeling of excitement that overcame me as I was announced as the winner is an emotional high that I will remember always. And although that fall fair weekend was filled with great enjoyment, the year that was to follow would provide me with my most valuable reward of winning the competition.

Being chosen the Ambassador gives one lucky person the chance to learn and then convey that knowledge to others. I learned a great deal about the town and its history throughout my reign. I carried a strong sense of pride each time I set out to another fair, banquet or town, knowing what wonderful people I was representing.

It's been almost four years since I was chosen to represent Acton and the Agricultural Society. There are wonderful memories that I could share with you about my reigning year, but instead I would like to tell you how representing my community has affected my life.

As Miss Acton I was given the opportunity to develop my self-esteem, public speaking and public relations skills. These are skills that helped me obtain a diploma in the three-year public relations program at Humber College.

For some reason there are many people who think this is a beauty pageant. As one such believer pointed out recently, I put on make-up, styled my hair and dressed nicely for the competition.

What he didn't know was that for the pageant I did research on my community, had a panel interview and spoke in front of hundreds of people. 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Protect yourself!

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
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
