Andrews places 37th at cross-country meet If only Michael Andrews was a

few inches taller and 35 pounds heavier.

It could have meant an impressive 15th place finish at the recent Banting Bronco cross-country meet at Springbank Park in London instead of his still respectable 37th place finish among the field of 151 finishers, according to Acton High coach Bruce Andrews.

The 16-year-old, 95-pound Andrews, who competed in the Junior Boys' 5,000-metre event, is forced to start fast to compensate for his low weight.

"He ran a good race," says his coach, "but he needs to grow to see any significant improvement. You have to have the weight to

bring on the strength at the end of the race.

"It (a growth spurt) would make all the difference in the world, but you can't ask any more from him. He's extremely dedicated, running at least six-days-a-week and 10kilometres a day."

But not all is bad with the 5foot-2 runner. His speed is coming around, having shaved 15 seconds offhis one-kilometre workouts and two minutes off his 10km time over the last year.

"After 800m in London he was 50th, but there was only about a 50m difference from first to 50th," the elder Andrews concedes.

Andrews will run at a meet in Kitchener this Friday.
