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## Redmen put on Jekyll, Hyde faces to open season

Ken Ellis had only two names on his mind heading into yesterday's (Tuesday) Junior Redmen volleyball home opener — Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde.

He wondered what team would show up. The Redmen who were swept by Iroquois Ridge on Thursday to open the 1994 high school season or the feisty group that advanced to the quarter-finals during the Redmen Invitational tourney on Friday.

"It was a very, very bad outing. The boys were nervous and didn't play near their capability," said coach Ellis on Monday after watching his Redmen drop three straight (15-5, 15-4 and 15-6) to Iroquois

Ridge high school in Oakville.

However on Friday, the locals made it to the quarter-finals of the

eight-team tourney, only to lose 16-14 they led 14-7 at one point — and 15-7 to the Oakville-Trafalgar Red Devils.

Even early in the tourney the Redmen seemed to show more poise, confidence and determination than the previous day.

eight-man outfit.

"At one point on Thursday I wanted the floor to open up, so we could start again."

> Ellis pointed out the Redmen's experience paled in comparison to Iroquois Ridge, which possesses 90 per cent of last year's Junior White Oaks team. Add in two club players and that was the difference.

"Even though it's early in the season they

(Iroquois) had two kids who knew what they were doing. I wish we could have played them on Friday," Ellis chuckled.

And speaking of Friday, the

Redmen opened against the E.C. Drury Spartans and left off from Thursday's debacle, dropping Game 1 by a 15-4 score. However, a gritty local outfit took to the floor the next game and had the upper hand for a while before falling 15-9.

Next, they traded 15-10 scores with Guelph Centennial before 15-12 and 15-10 setbacks to Brampton's Mayfield high school. Like their first match against O.T., the Redmen held a 14-7 lead against Mayfield in one game, but for whatever reason couldn't put home the next point.

"We played well as a team, but (failing to get the 15th point) was due to nerves, experience, whatever. But if the guys get their heads

on, they'll be respectable," professed Ellis. He noted the Redmen's play went to pieces following the heartbreaking opening loss to O.T.

Ellis was impressed by the work of third-year Junior Trevor Malloy on Friday, along with setter Derrick McIntyre. He also mentioned middle Todd Schonnop, criticized for his slow feet on Thursday, got the message and shone against O.T.

"I'm looking forward to this season more based on Friday's performance," Ellis said.

The 0-1 Redmen played Milton District High yesterday.

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
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
