As Ontario's ambassadors of good news, the community newspaper industry seeks to acknowledge and encourage youth by bringing to light the many positive contributions which young people make to their communities.

Every week, the pages of this community newspaper and hundreds like it throughout Ontario contain articles about people who are the heartbeat of their communities.

The Junior Citizens program depends upon members of the community to nominate deserving candidates who should be considered for such an award.

Acton's Sara Murphy was recognized last year with a Junior Citizen certificate. Sara is an active young person who has volunteered her time to FoodShare, the Cancer Society, the Heart and Stroke Foundation and her church.


Today's Junior Citizen is tomorrow's community leader. Do you know one?

Loss of police office concerns committee

To the Editor,

The Acton Community Consultation Committee — which is a group of citizens working with the police (village constables) on issues that are of concern in Acton — wants the citizens of Acton to be aware that the Acton Police Station on Mill Street East is going to be closed at the end of October as part of the cutbacks that are being made.

This downtown office provides a drop-in where citizens can discuss face-to-face their fears or concerns with the village constables and therefore develop a positive relationship between the police and the community.

With the closing of this office the citizens of Acton will have to travel to Georgetown for any interviewing that has to be done.

Addressing small issues at the local level greatly reduces the chances of these becoming big issues. This committee is deeply concerned that the removal of this very important link between the police and the people of Acton will mean a decrease in the security of our town.
