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Junior v-ballers better '93 mark after 3 games

Two weeks ago Ken Ellis was wondering whether his Junior volleyball players were willing to commit for the 1994 season.

Well, they're definitely committed to winning. The latest installment was a surprising upending of the heavily-favoured Bishop Reding Royals in Milton on Thursday to give the Acton High Redmen two straight wins.

For Ellis, the worry of comitment has been thrown out the door — at

least for now — for talk of being a legitimate threat by season's end.

"At our recent tourney we thought Oakville Trafalgar was the dominant team and Bishop Reding beat them, so maybe we have a chance to hang in till the end of the season," said a hopeful Ellis following the Redmen's 15-8, 1-15, 16-14 effort in Milton.

Typical of the 1994 Redmen, the visitors stormed into the lead at 8-1, only to watch Reding chip away. But the Redmen put the game away before a big scare.

That was saved for Game 2 when the Royals frightened Ellis and Co. heading into the deciding game with a humiliating 15-1 verdict.

"It wasn't like we were taking them lightly, either," Ellis said.

The highlight of the day, though, may not have been the Redmen's sterling 16-14 victory in a marathon third match, but the poise and confidence they exhibited in putting aside the previous collapse, namely Game 2.

"We shook it off. The kids were

just flying after the game. I credit captain Trevor Malloy. He did his best to keep the guys' confidence level up. He's becoming a real leader," said Ellis.

The coach also pointed to the play of setter Derrick McIntyre, who starred with consistent serving. "He's hustling all the time."

Before his 2-1 Redmen host Q.E. Park tomorrow (Thursday, 5 pm), Ellis will try and shore up the middle blocking, which he says will suffer greatly "when we play teams that can consistently hit."

Meanwhile, the Redmen started their home season last Tuesday on a winning note, disposing of the Milton Mustangs 2-1 (13-15, 15-10, 15-13).

The problem early on, reported Ellis, was consistency.

"We seem to go to pieces after establishing an early lead and like to play comeback (volleyball)," he said, noting Game 3 when the Redmen nearly coughed up a lead.

Ellis lauded the serving of Jamie Birrell and the quarterbacking of McIntyre as setter.


"But I wish I had three or four guys at that height, because we would have a better chance when we're attacking," stated Andrews. The key for the Redmen, An-

"They weren't moving to the ball quick enough," said Andrews. "The ideas were there to get to the ball, but they didn't. We played with the ball like it was a hot potato."


However, Shelley Hand did test the mesh just over a minute into the second quarter, recording the Redmen's lone basket after 16 minutes and sending them to the half down 40-2.

The Redmen play at Q.E. Park tomorrow (Thursday).



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
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
