Butcher shop still may move

There is still hope for an Acton couple's proposal to build a butcher shop and apartment unit on their Main Street property.

Despite a long list of objections from Town planning staff, most Town Councillors seem confident that outstanding issues can be resolved and that Al and Janet Cunneyworth, owners of Al and Al's Red Brand Meats on Mill Street, will be able to proceed with their plans.

The Cunneyworths want to build a two-storey building at their home and property on Main Street North, to house a butcher shop and a three-bedroom apartment.

Town planning staff recommend rejecting the plan because it represents an over-development of the site in an inappropriate location and is not in the best interest of long term planning for Acton.

Staff also have concerns about the number of parking spaces provided and the incompatibility with the surrounding residential area.

After hearing the Cunneyworths' agent, Gordon Driedger, say that the Cunneyworths are not inflexible and that there was an opportunity to look again at the issues, Councillor Norm Elliott suggested that staff's report against the proposal be deferred.

"A lot of the staff rationale to reject this plan was based on the false assumption that there is no on-street parking on Main Street," Elliott explained.

Councillor Gerald Rennie supported the deferral to allow for more discussion.

"This area is on the verge of transition," Rennie said. "There is a church beside the site and the potential for an antique shop just down the street.

"Next door is an institution that deals with health problems and north of the site is a variety store. That side of the street is on the verge of some kind of transition and it would be useful for planning staff to look at that."

Staff hope to have another report for Council on the application by the end of November.

There are no suspects in the crime, according to police.


