
Kinsella sighting a false alarm

A possible sighting of escaped killer Allan Kinsella here on the weekend turned out to be a false alarm.






FAST-TRACKERS!

For Halton's Commissioner of Public Works, there is a frustrating irony in the current Acton water-related development freeze.

Everyone is waiting to see if fish in Black Creek will be harmed by the effluent that would be gen-

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erated by several thousand more people. If ongoing tests show the fish and aquatic life would be harmed, development of Acton

would not proceed as planned.

Art Leitch said there is enough water and enough sewer capacity to handle 10,000 people, but the powers-that-be won't let Acton use the approved capacity at the sewage treatment plant.

Leitch said the situation is "bizarre" because the Acton sewage treatment plant is putting out a superb effluent.

"The treatment plant is the reason Black Creek is now cleaned up to the point that fish can live in it," Leitch said Thursday.

"Before Halton built that plant, Black Creek deserved its name. The irony is that the very sewage plant that cleaned up the creek to the point that fish could live in it is now being denied it's potential because of a concern that using it to approved capacity might have an adverse effect on the fish.

"We've done such a good job we are now paying the price of progress."

In a memo to Halton Council on Wednesday Leitch updated members on the current water supply.

Ten residential developments —the equivalent of 375 people have been given a water allocation, leaving Acton with a water deficit, at least on paper.

Leitch said the water deficit is not a concern at this point because many of the empty buildings and stores in town are not consuming water they have been allocated.

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


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Food drive
