## Good odds for Acton growth

A Halton Region official is optimistic development will occur early next year based on preliminary results revealed at a recent meeting with the Ministry of Energy and Environment concerning the Acton Water-Quarry baseline study of Black Creek.

The eight-month study, which began in January, determined what the effects of future growth and additional water pumping from Prospect Park will have on brook trout in Black Creek and on other fish and marine life in Fairy Lake.

"There was positive feedback from the various government agen-

gion, confirmed on Monday. "They signed off a letter indicating they had accepted everything to date."

Namely data from the study, which involved a tremendous amount of field work and a lot of analysis of water samples.

The Region will take its findings to Toronto today (Wednesday), where the Ontario Municipal Board will hold a pre-hearing, to monitor progress of this project.

Leung doesn't expect a formal announcement to come from this hearing and added one will likely come in January when the final report, including the Region's implementation strategy, will be

"I'm optimistic development will occur because I've been in-

volved with this project for a long time and the best chance we have is with the various agencies.

"They've been reactive to what we proposed," Leung revealed. "We brought them into our team and have worked as one with them on a monthly basis. They've had no problem agreeing with our methodology and I hope they won't disagree in where we go from here."

For now, Leung just hopes the cost for improvements, with regard to key components in the study, are not too costly.

He warned the Region can't spend a lot of money on the sewage treatment plant. He suggested using some money from lot levies to improve the facility, enabling growth without adding further burden to existing taxpayers.

Leung also mentioned a representative for the developers will sit in on future meetings, so "we (the Region) aren't over-committing them on developing costs."

After today's meeting, the Region will work with a consultant to design an implementation plan, that will consist of discussions as to what improvements are required, when they will be dealt with, and at what cost.

Leung says this should be completed by the end of January. At that time, Leung hopes to be in a position to apply for the necessary approvals and then for development to commence.

## Town reps still aiming for zero tax increase

Heading into budget talks, Town staff and Council are aiming for a tax increase no greater than 1.5 per cent — the estimated 1995 rate of inflation.
