'ASSIC threatened' by reform

With the future of Acton Support Services and Information Centre (ASSIC) and long-term care in North Halton in the balance, a concerned group of local seniors and caregivers will travel to Oakville tonight (Wednesday) to try to convince a Regional Health body that a "home-grown, local approach" is needed for long-term care reform.

The delegation has 15 minutes to present their report, arguing in favour of establishing a Halton

Hills Multi-Service Agency (MSA) to handle long-term care services. These would include Meals-on-Wheels, nursing and home care for the elderly and disabled, among others.

The Halton District Health Council (HDHC) will vote on a report from the Long-Term Care Committee tonight that suggests a Regional, not local, approach to service, planning and delivery.

Sunday night, Long-Term Care Committee member and Halton Hills chief librarian Betsy Cornwell urged a small group of Acton

and Georgetown service providers and users to go to Oakville and make a show of force.

"We think that it is rather important that the Council see there is considerable support for a local MSA," Cornwell said.

Cornwell said communities must look after their own long-term care needs, as is now being done by ASSIC.

Cornwell warned that ASSIC is threatened by the reform because many services will be consolidated and delivered by a central MSA office, which might not be ASSIC.
