"They're off to a great start," offers student council advisor Dorothy Platner. "They're a close group and work well together, so I think things look good for this year."


George, who's also involved in soccer at Acton High, admits council seems to have more freedom, unlike last year, in its decision to run certain fund-raisers.

The student council sponsored school cafetorium. We have a Friday's Yuk Yuk's show at the photo of that event on Page 7.

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
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
