The application for the grant

calls for the Board to pay 45 per cent of the project, said to cost between \$500,000 and \$600,000; federal infrastructure funding will cover 33 per cent and the province will cover the remaining 22.

Whiting said the Board will be debenturing, so they

can mortgage their end of payments and recover the cost over a four to 4½ year period.

"I know it's all tax money, but if we don't use it now (the feds) are going to give it somewhere else," Whiting remarked.

He went on to say about 80 per cent of parents will be happy with the decision, "especially at M.Z. because they have all the benefits. They'll get an early start on the McKenzie-Smith swim team and the school band, which helps round out their education."


Both principals, Chris Logan at McKenzie-Smith and M.Z. Bennett's Laura Clark, are pleased a step forward has been taken in physically linking the schools.

"It will be nice to have a concept of K-8," said Logan, adding two-thirds of the school would consist of Grade 6, 7 and 8 students. "There would be better flow to programs, with students and staff and ideas they could create."

"I'm anxiously awaiting the final decision," Clark added. "Having older students in a building with our kids as friends and helpers would be great. Also it will be nice for our kids to grow up and not have to leave our school.

"It's nice to know the gears are in motion."

There were no injuries reported.


