To cover some of the cost, each employee took \$1 off their pay cheque through the year, while IGA covered the balance.

Also, the money was put toward purchasing flowers for any employees who were sick and unable to attend the event. McArthur says Acton IGA conducts an internal gift exchange.

Atalarger company, like BPCO on Main Street, a gift exchange isn't easy, so each department gets together for lunch.

As well, a week before Christmas, BPCO will hold a dinner and dance at the Guelph Legion for 200 people, including 120 hourly employees, 40 salary workers and 40 retirees.

After lavish affairs in the '70s and '80s, a downsize in the company and a faltering economy, BPCO's parent company Emco Ltd. has deemed the Christmas function be self-funded.

"We usually get together the first Monday in December before the season gets busy," says Susan Allen, assistant general manager. "Monday is the quietest night for us and the restaurant."
