undertaken, with last year's being the construction of a one-room school on Naming'azi Youth training farm. At the same time, David helped to teach farming and carpentry skills to young people.


Miriam instructed knitting, sewing, cooking, health, hygiene and financial management.

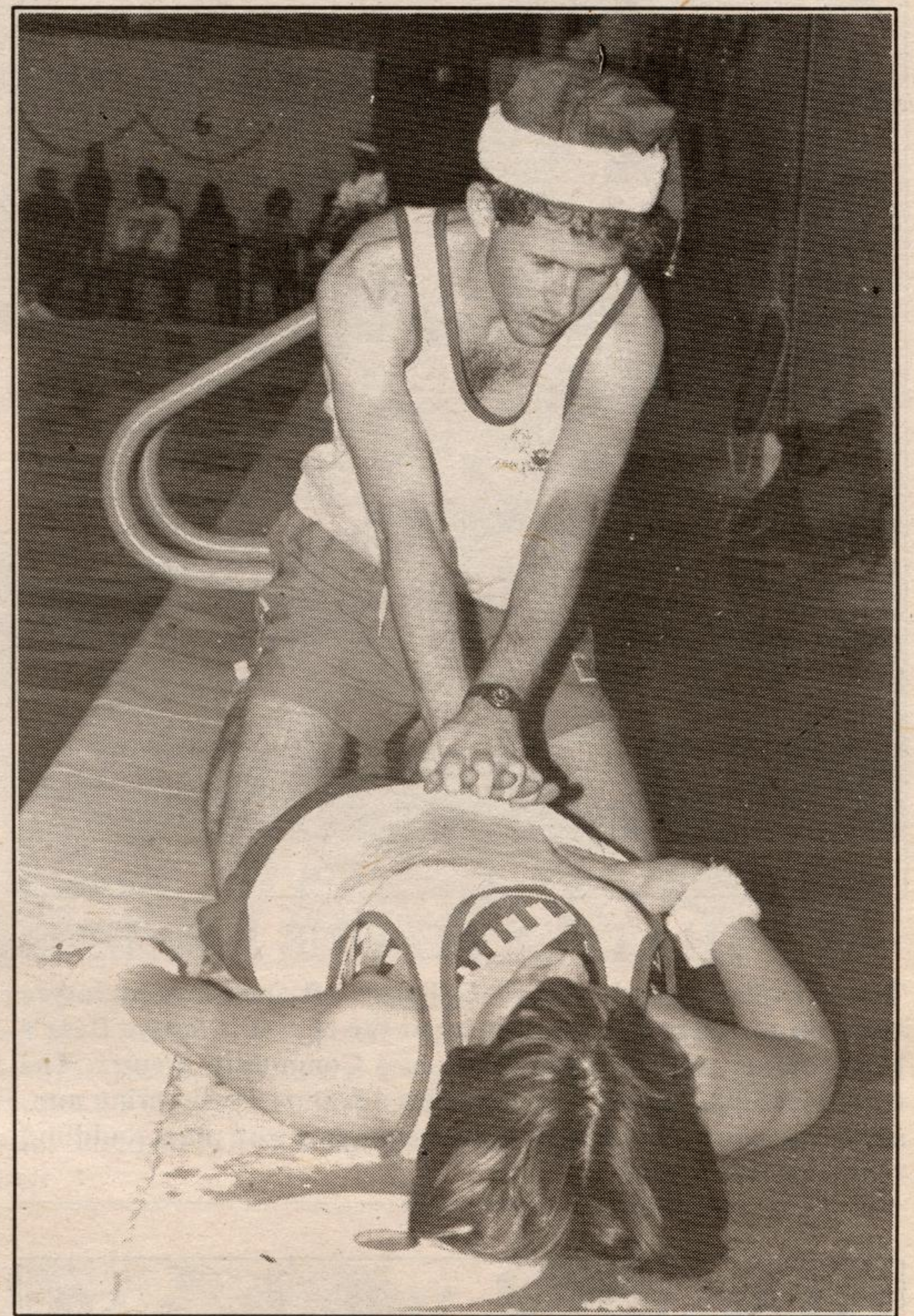
## Bazaar winners


