Almost half of Rockwood's 804 establishments, including homes and businesses, have signed-up for natural gas installation since

Union Gas stormed into the village prior to Labour Day.

As of Thursday, 365 services (45 per cent) had been applied for and onethird of those had natural gas in use on Nov. 4, when the first section of the village was turned on.

Bruce Weaver, coordinator of customer contact for Union

Gas, says the remaining two-thirds of applicants will have natural gas operating in their homes by Christmas. equipment installation will be on-going through January.

"We started Sept. 1, and to have 365 services three months later is tremendous. The logistics to carry out a project of this magnitude are quite high," says Weaver, who adds Union Gas is close to their first-year forecast of 411 services.

"We're close to what we expected, which is very good. People in Rockwood have been favourable toward natural gas. A few have already seen a drop in their electric bills.

"There's usually a second wave (of applications) after word-ofmouth travels."

of 10 people daily inside the Union Gas trailer in front of the fire hall, says there will be more positive reaction to cost savings come January and February.

One thing Weaver and Brent

Lemon, who's in charge of construction, have been impressed with is their reception here.

"It's nice to come to a town where the people look forward to your service. People have been very cooperative and friendly," Lemon commends.

Adds Weaver: "People have been

pleased with the neatness of our contractors installing pipelines."

However, while some home owners may not be impressed with ripped-up lawns, Lemon says they will be restored to their pre-September look come mid-May or June when drier weather returns.

Weaver emphasizes it's not too late to sign-up. He says the office (trailer), which will remain in town until March, will help people deal with the conversion process and he encourages people to visit and ask questions.

Meanwhile, Weaver says Union Gas will be looking closer at Eden Mills this winter in terms of cost analysis and determining how much gas would be used there.

Eden Mills residents could have Weaver, who sees an average natural gas in the next two years.
