AHS Seniors to focus on team play

Bob McKay doesn't measure success by wins or losses. To him, it's how you work with your teammates and play as a team.

It will be his job as the Acton Redmen Senior girls' volleyball coach to bring together four returning Seniors, seven graduating Juniors and a player who has been away from the court for two years, as a tight-knit group.

"You can't underestimate or overestimate the importance of players getting along. And not just the starters, but everyone," says McKay, who's in his third year coaching at Acton High.

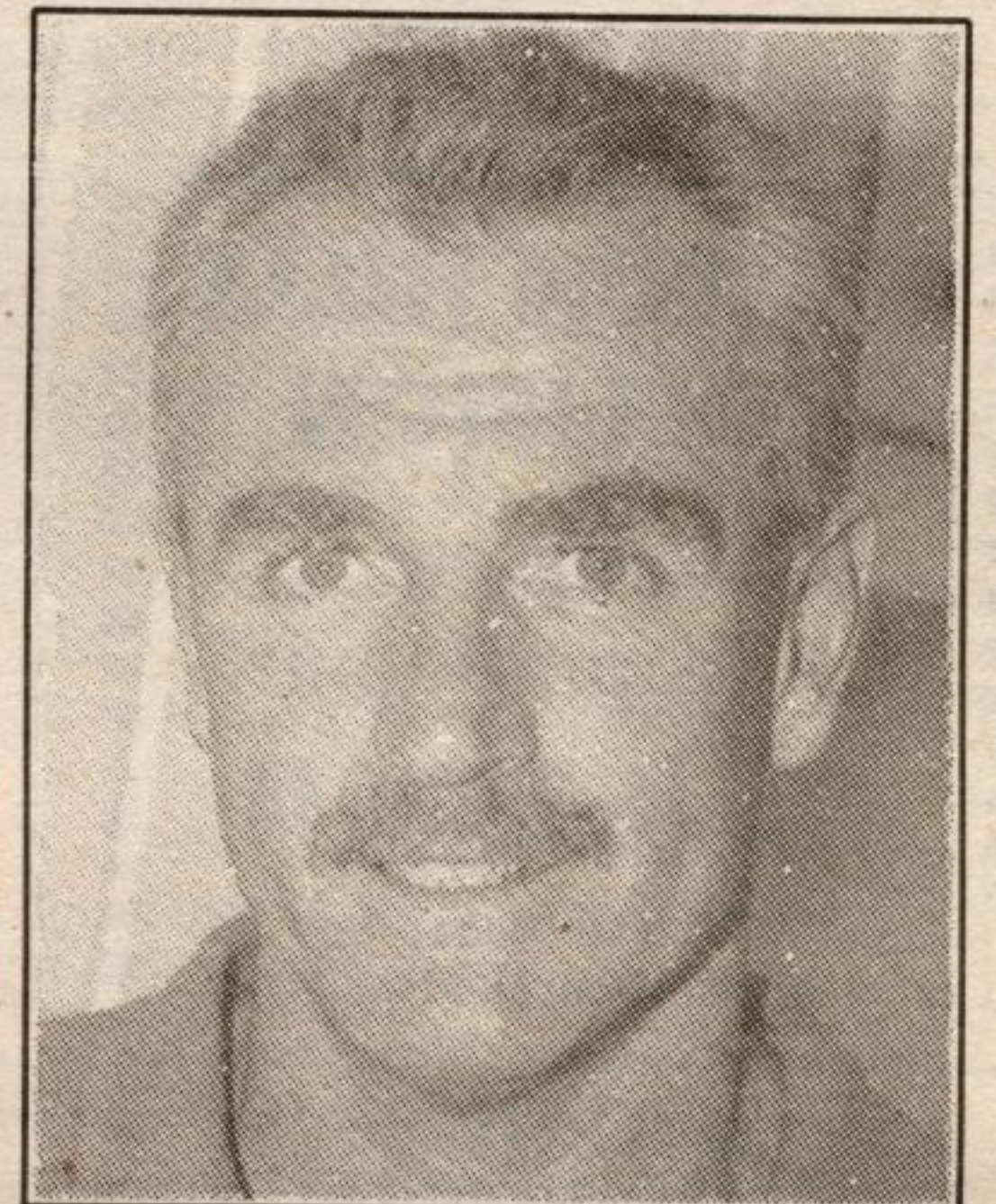
"This has to be achieved to be successful. And it has to be fun for me, too."

A phys-ed teacher at Georgetown High, McKay is excited this year by his players' desire to learn the game.

They are returnees Shelby DaPonte, Jenny Goy, Krista Keir and Pam Olsen and first-year Seniors Jamie Davies, Shelley Hand, Nicole Hargrave, Jackie Jahn, Jen McKay, Shondra Stroud and Heather Trotter. Shari Patenaude, who just came off a spectacular season as the Senior girls' basketball team's leading scorer, returns after a two-year absence.

"They are starting to learn this

game has to be played as a team rather than six individuals," says McKay, who had the unpleasant job of cutting six players, some of whom were returning Seniors and players he coached in Junior last year. "Volleyball involves everyone doing their job in their positions and adjusting to attacks."

Progressing on schedule, McKay says getting the new players adjusted to his defensive system is crucial to start the season.

The Redmen will play man-to-man at the net and zone in the backcourt. The alignment is designed to get the blockers up.

"Everyone has to remember their own job," warns the 13-year coach, an Acton resident. "We can't mix man coverage in the backcourt or we'll be in real trouble."

What shouldn't be a trouble spot for the Redmen during the 1994 season is blocking. They are led by the tandem of Goy and Trotter. McKay also sees Hargrave "one of the better servers in Halton," being a major cog in his team's success.

McKay added the Redmen are still struggling with consistent setting, but he added it's still early.

"I'm feeling good about this season. We're definitely looking at making the playoffs in the 10-team Volpe Division. If we do that we'll definitely pursue fighting for an A-Division berth in the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations championships," he says.

The Georgetown Rebels and White Oaks are the teams to beat.

"I like playing quality teams and when you play them (the Rebels), it's solid opposition. And you can only learn by it," offers McKay.
