"I would also like to see some-


thing happen on the weekend involving adults," Katsilieris stated.

Call Crimestoppers with info

A vicious assault on an Acton store clerk has Halton detectives seeking your help to find the thug responsible.

On Tuesday, Dec. 6 at about 6 pm a man entered the Smoke Shoppe at 56A Mill St. E. The suspect suddenly rushed the store clerk and punched her in the mouth. The force of the blow knocked the complainant to the floor; she was then dragged to the register where the culprit forced her to open the till.

Some money was taken from the cash register, and the suspect fled from the store. He was last seen heading west on Mill Street.

Police are searching for a man described as white, late teens or early 20s, and about 5'8" tall. He wore a dark-coloured toque, dark scarf and dark coat.
