Fall Fair '95 planning begins

With one of the "best fairs ever" under it belt, members of the Acton Agricultural Society are already planning this year's Fall Fair.

Agricultural Society members met for their annual meeting on Saturday at Knox church to elect new directors, assess last year's fair and plot strategy.

Perhaps the best news of the day came from Society secretarytreasurer Daniel Varanelli, who noted the fair had doubled its net income in 1994 to \$11,922.

"We had a great fair in terms of various income categories," explained. Varanelli told The Tanner during a break in the meeting.

"Admissions were up, we rented more concession space and the regular money-makers, like the beer tent and craft tent, were up.

"There were some fee increases this year, but at the same time we tried to be responsible in regard to those increases, which ultimately helped out with the bottom line."

Varanelli also noted that the Society did not submit a grant request to the Town this year because they were in such good shape financially.

Janis Fread, acclaimed for another term as president, announced that the Society has received funding from the Province to do a feasibility study on the arena.

The aging arena is used extensively by the Society during the fair for exhibits, dances, demonstrations and displays.

"The Town has indicated that once the new arena is built, the old one will be torn down," Fread newcomers Jim Pink, Kelly White,

"Our plan is to take over the Doug Fread. existing arena and use it as a yearcould make money."

The feasibility study will determine if there would be enough use to maintain the building for meetings, small trade shows and community events.

"This study will tell us if we could turn it into a money-maker.

As an arena the building is in bad shape and even for what we want to do, we don't know if we could afford to upgrade it," Fread said.

Another highlight of last year's fair was the parade, which had 62 entries. Parade chairman Jim Warrington, reported very few glitches and so many entries that some floats hadn't even begun the parade as others were finishing.

Society members elected eight directors to the 18-member board of directors at the meeting. John Bouclair, Robert McKee and Russ Murray were re-elected, along with Mary Martin, Troy LaRoche and

All of the executive were acround business proposition that claimed to another term including Janis Fread as president, Jim Warrington and first vice-president and Ron White as second vice-president.

Society members also set the fair dates for this year — the 82nd edition of the Acton Fall Fair will be Sept. 15, 16 and 17.




