At least a dozen artists will be represented, including Carole



### Gym packed Complex tax changes for Eramosa

Some Eramosa taxpayers face "significant tax increases" this year — the effect of dissolving the

Rockwood and Eden Mills police villages and county-wide reassessment.

Eramosa treasurer Terry Noble said the complex changes make it almost impossible to say what effect they will have on the average taxpayer.

"Generally speaking county-wide reassessment has reduced taxes in the rural, farm-type area and increased taxes in the urban centres. The dissolution of the police villages shifts a small tax burden from the villages to the entire township," Noble explained in an interview on Monday.

The Township's \$2.5 million operating and capital budget includes a \$1.3 million tax levy, which is a 3 per cent increase over last year, but an expenditure of \$1,500 less.

The police villages used to levy taxes for their own purposes and that amount was about 3 per cent of the whole Township levy.

Those taxes are now being levied over the Township so Council raised taxes just enough to cover what the police villages used to raise.

Reeve Rick Hughes said that the 3 per cent increase in the tax levy will be earmarked for a capital reserve fund to pay for future bridge work.

"We are looking at 10 to 15 years of bridge replacement work and what we have in the reserve fund should cover the design costs

for the first bridge on the list, which is the Eden Mills Bowstring bridge," Hughes said on Saturday.

"We need to set a pattern of making provisions for a fairly healthy reserve for bridge work so we avoid large increases in the future."

Hughes said despite the fact the Council is just five months old and the treasurer only came on the job in March, the Township budget is

a good one that shows restraint.

"We hope to examine our programs and come up with a smarter delivery service for Township programs before budget time next year," Hughes said.
