There is no secret to success in politics these days. You must listen to the people, declare your intentions, and stay the course. Simply, that's what the Tories did.

Bob Rae started out promising us he wouldn't make any promises. Question: Does that mean if

he was re-elected (shudder) and he did anything, he would be breaking his promise? He ended up promising us Armageddon.

Rightly or wrongly, the Liberals were perceived as not having enough substance. We're not buying the "definite maybe" approach any more. Our favourite colour isn't plaid.







