

Bridge, DaPonte are tops at AHS

Darrell Bridge didn't play any school sports last year, so he jumped at the chance this year to make up for lost time on the field and played three.

Shelby DaPonte, on the other hand, who in some years has juggled six sports, decided her last year of high school should be devoted to making up for lost time as well — in the classroom.

And though they directed their energies in different directions, success followed them, as they were named Acton high school's top male and female athletes of the year at an awards picnic last Wednesday at Prospect Park.

"I didn't expect to win," says Bridge, who was an integral part of the Senior Boys' Redmen volleyball, basketball and soccer squads. "Not playing last year, I thought I would get involved as much as possible and thought I had a chance to win. But there are some really good athletes here."

Bridge, 19, also copped the MVP award for basketball, his first love. This award took him by surprise, because he considers himself a team motivator, not the superstar.

"Attitude," is what the 5-foot-9, 175-pounder feels gave him the nod as top male athlete. "I'm a big-time supporter of the teams. It's team first for me. I would never let the team get down on themselves. I'm known to be yelling at my teammates, but it's usually positive," he grinned.


Hoping to attend the University of Waterloo and study mathematics in September, Bridge admits that pushing his teammates to do their best was hard at times, since the locals have struggled to compete with larger Halton schools.

"Basketball was the hardest," he said, "because you would be blown out by 60 or 70 points, have a morning practice the next day and no one would want to show."

Bridge contends he wouldn't want to be the elite player in the spotlight, saying too many players have an air about them that they carry their team. "I'd rather dish the ball off to a player who doesn't score much."

At 19 and one of the school's older female athletes, the competitive DaPonte became more of a leader-type this year.

academic standing with aspirations to study Kinesiology at either McMaster University, the University of Ottawa or the University of Western Ontario, DaPonte trimmed her athletics schedule to basketball, volleyball and badminton this year.

The lighter workload helped her win praise both academically and athletically.

She will carry a 98 per cent average into the year-end exam in one class, was part of the Senior Girls' volleyball that advanced to OFSAA last fall, was named MVP for Girls' volleyball and teamed with Sherri Ann Sealy to place fourth at the Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference (GHAC) badminton doubles championships.
