Aren't you tired of these people treating us like we have the IQ of a salamander? Honest to God, didn't the last two elections teach them anything? Aarraaagh!



Isn't "white feather-headed eagle" much better than "bald eagle?" Well, isn't it?



Couldn't have said it better myself. Just an afterthought.






"People are still sore about the strike. I still watch the odd game on TV, but a friend of mind who used to go twice a month won't go. It will take along time before the fans come back."
