Potential new school names puzzle local residents

Sir Donald Mann. Thomas Moore. Bennett-Smith.

Will one of these names adorn the soon-to-be physically linked M.Z. Bennett and McKenzie-Smith schools come the start of classes in September?

While the existing names of the two Acton Boulevard schools will remain to identify wings of the building, the community is being asked over the summer for their input as to what name relevant to Acton's history should represent the building as a whole.

Local Trustee Tim Kingsbury brought forward the motion at the Halton Board of Education's May 25 meeting on behalf of former Acton Trustee Dave Whiting, who recently moved to Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, to pursue other career interests.

"Dave had discussed the name change in the community before he left and wanted his wishes to be carried out," says Kingsbury, who adds the motion—for community reflection and input — was deferred until the Sept. 14 meeting.

"If the name change becomes an issue I will ask that it be deferred further, but I encourage

people to call me."

The two suggested names for the school at this time are Sir Donald Mann and Thomas Moore. Mann was, with partner William McKenzie, builder of the Canadian Northern Railway, which became the national railway. Mann was born and educated in Acton.

Moore was a first-class carpenter and an Acton principal of 25 years around 1900.

"Sir Donald Mann already has a park named after him and he really had nothing to do with education in Acton," argues 64-year Acton resident George Elliott, a former professor at the University of Guelph.

"He really did nothing for the town, other than fact he was born here and his parents lived here."

Elliott suggests the name Bennett-Smith. "Even Acton Public School would have some historic connotation."

Both McKenzie-Smith and M.Z. Bennett principals Chris Logan and Laura Clark refused comment on the issue, with the latter saying, "we're not being involved (in the decision). It's more of a community issue."

If no other suggestions are offered through the summer, Kings-


bury says Sir Donald Mann will be the new school name.

"Sir Donald Mann was one of the richest men in Canada and well-known to get the park in town named after him, but he made his fortune outside of Acton," explains longtime resident Hartley Coles.


Replacement sought




