## Precast concrete bridge won't be built in Eden Mills

A precast concrete structure will not be used to replace the deteriorating Bowstring Bridge in Eden Mills.

Eramosa Township's consulting engineering firm said it approves of the technology, but the use of precast spans and culverts,

instead of conventional pouredin-place structures, depends on many variables, including soil conditions, hydrology and road clear-

Faced with a multi-million dollar price tag to replace 19 of the Township's bridges, Council asked staff to investigate the precast technology, brought to

Council's attention by a ratepayer.

In a letter to Council, Trevor Smith of Triton Engineering Services said the recommendation to use the technology would depend on the specific project needs and conditions at each bridge site.

Small said using a precast concrete culvert is not feasible in Eden Mills because the minimum verti-

cal walls for road speed design can not be met if the bridge driving surface is to be raised, unless a significant amount of private land, necessary to build the bridge approaches, was acquired.

Small also said the arch shape of the product makes its use uneconomical for the Bowstring replacement job.

The pros for using precast structures include rapid installation, long service life, low maintenance and lower costs.

Reeve Rick Hughes said the hydrology, the river flow, will determine what type of structure will be used in Eden Mills.

Survey work is underway to replace the Bowstring bridge.

# Rash of vandalism deemed 'isolated cases'

A rash of vandalism in the village two weeks ago, including between 10 and 13 occurrences and 14 different mischief charges, was an isolated case, says Rockwood Community Oriented Police

(COP) officer Andrew Ferguson.

"Rockwood's been pretty quiet for a while. This latest incident shocked a lot of people, but I think it was just a matter of getting blitzed in one night and everyone was a victim," Ferguson explained on Friday.

Police received several reports from homeowners of damage to lawns, shrubs and fences, as a late 1970s cream-coloured pick-up truck was driven across properties and through neighbourhoods.

Other occurrences included a red Firebird stolen from a Rock-

wood home and later recovered on Hwy. 24 and two other stolen cars —a grey Camaro and an Acadian.

The truck was stolen from a home on Hwy. 24 and taken for a joy ride. It was later involved in an accident at Eramosa and Speedvale in Guelph, where the culprits apparently made off on foot.

Ferguson said the cause of damage could be estimated at \$3,500.

Guelph OPP Constable Belinda Rose, who is the investigating officer in this case, said on Friday that more than two males, as was initially reported, were involved in the vandalism. One sporting a shaved head and the other appeared to a be a teen who couldn't see over the steering wheel.

As well, Rose added, the Firebird may have had personalized or new-style plates.

"One of the culprits even asked someone on the street at three in the morning where the truck went," she commented. "There were four vehicles involved, so someone must have seen them."

When asked if Rockwood was a target for these acts, since it's a small town, Ferguson replied, "possibly."

"Rockwood doesn't have a big night-life and a lot of people commute, so stores aren't open late. There are no factories and the streets are usually quiet by 11 pm on weeknights," said Ferguson. "Therefore you don't have the volume of traffic and eyes."


