Proposed names for the new school created by the linking of McKenzie-Smith and M.Z. Bennett have upset and confused a number of Actonites - but now a local citizen has confidently come forward with his own suggestion.

"I really think that it's the perfect solution," said R.R. 2, Acton resident Brian Smith, who brought his proposal in to The Tanner offices on Friday afternoon.

"The new school, as an entity, should be named after the late who was born and raised here." Gary Dawkins. Then the Primary wing could be maintained as the M.Z. Bennett campus, while the Intermediate wing remains the McKenzie-Smith campus."

Not only is Smith, 50, an interested citizen, he is the son of the late Elmer Smith, one of the two Acton educators for whom the present middle school is named.

The other is the late Pat McKenzie, whose wife Mary still lives in town. "And Mary was agreeable when I phoned her with this idea," assured Smith.

Gary Dawkins was principal at McKenzie-Smith at the time of his sudden death in July 1979. He was just 41-years-old.



Smith concurs: "This solution would preserve Acton's educational heritage. Sir Donald Mann was a railroad guy; what did he have to do with education?
