For 13-year-old Rob, he was a little leery at the prospects of facing an imposing figure two years his senior who sported a goatee. The latter waited anxiously with bated breath, smelling a landslide.

Rob, though, smartly withdrew from a stare down, focussing solely on knocking off the behemoth in the children's Super-Heavyweight Division. He quickly curled his opponent's wrist and brought his arm toward him for the surprisingly easy victory.

"I was just quicker than him, but I was pretty scared. His arms were pretty big," conceded 140-pound Rob, who placed for the first time in his third Ontario final.

They met again later, but Rob was no more confident.

"He looked pretty determined and tried a lot harder the second time," Rob, a McKenzie-Smith student, acknowledged.

But Rob, who duplicated his big brother with an unblemished 4-0 record, reigned victorious.

"I hope the Club continues to show its support for the competitive kids."


## Rockwood No-Stars post 3rd playoff win
