Trustee candidates square off

With less than a month until nominations close, two candidates have thrown their hats into the ring in the race to fill the vacant Acton trustee seat on the Halton Board of Education.

Both Susan McPhail-Job of Acton, and Gary Crosbie of Georgetown, have registered as candidates and now can accept campaign contributions in their bids to fill Dave Whiting's seat, empty since June.

Crosbie, a clerk conveyancer with a Brampton law firm, is critical of both the Ministry of Education and Halton Board.

"I became involved with education because of problems my son was having in school," Crosbie explained on Thursday.

"I am concerned with the curriculum, with the whole language approach to teaching, which I don't

think teaches spelling or grammar, and the basics for reading, which is the key to learning," Crosbie said.

Crosbie, the 36-year-old father of two, said he would bring dedication and concern to the table.

McPhail-Job, 38, said her interest in the education system has increased because both her children will enter the Halton system next month.

"I'd like to see where 60 per cent of my tax dollars go," McPhail-Job said on Thursday.

"I know that it may sound like a cliché, but I'd like to see that the quality of education in Halton is as high as it is elsewhere and I don't know if that is true."

McPhail-Job, who works parttime at Tim Horton's and Freezer Frenzy, said her campaign will include a lot of door-knocking and asking people about their education concerns. McPhail-Job, an office manager before having children, joked that she would be a great negotiator at the Board because that is what she now does on a daily basis with her children.

Candidates may register up until Monday, Sept. 25. Candidates must file nomination papers, signed by 10 eligible Ward 1 and 2 voters on four days, including Sept. 19, 20, 21 and 25. Election day is Monday, Oct. 23.


Tuitman runs


