Big Brothers coming to town

September is Big Brothers Month, and Acton will mark the occasion by opening its first-ever office.

Although details concerning what day and hours the office will be open at McKenzie-Smith are still to be determined, the group's executive director is excited and optimistic of its potential here.

"I'm raring to go," said Evelyn Gransaull last week. "We'll be taking it step-by-step, so we'll make sure a strategic plan is in place, including a community representative, but I am positive."

Gransaull explained that "we felt we needed to start serving our communities (Acton, Oakville, Milton and Georgetown) better. We have an excellent program and we weren't reaping the benefits we have to offer."

The only problem with opening in Acton is that there aren't a lot of Little Brothers waiting here, but Gransaull said that should change "once we get the word out."

"We would like to have 10 Big Brothers in Acton when we start, but we don't have 10 children."

Big Brothers of Halton is a community-based charitable organization committed to providing and fostering a positive male influence to boys with absent fathers.

Gransaull was ecstatic that Big Brothers had already received a call-before the office had opened - from an Acton man interested in becoming a Big Brother.

She said Big Brothers must be over 18 years of age, must be responsible citizens in the community, must like children and be men who care and understand the art of friendship.

Stressing that the screening process of applicants is quite strict, Gransaull said there is a two-hour interview, along with the applicant providing six references before the clinic will even consider offering them a position.

"And if there is any doubt about the person," she added, "you better believe we won't approve of the applicant - for the safety of the children."

Most people who are interested

in becoming a Big Brother, but who are apprehensive, said Gransaull, likely don't know what the program is all about, are turned off by a scary time commitment or worried about the ever-lingering sexual abuse situation.

The same goes for a mother applying to put her son in the program, she pointed out. But the mother is put through an information session to learn about the program and the training the hired volunteers must go through.

When details are ironed out with McKenzie-Smith, Gransaull said the Big and Little Brothers will have use of the indoor pool and gymnasium one night during the week for volleyball, basketball and floor hockey.

To sign up as a Big Brother, Little Brother or for more information, call Gransaull or Susan Smith, who will be Acton's case worker, Tuesdays through Thursdays. The telephone number is 853-5902.

The Friends of Halton Hills Libraries is a non-profit organization dedicated to supporting the library. They are presently looking for new members and invite you to join them in their activities.


