

Tears at Robson's memorial service

With tears, fond memories and a deep sense of loss, Town Councillors said a public goodbye Monday night to the late Ward 2 Councillor Bill Robson, who collapsed and died of a heart attack at a Regional meeting last Wednesday.

With his family in the gallery, Council held a brief memorial service to say farewell to Bill Robson, who had served on Town and Regional Council for four years.

Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson noted that while Councillor Robson never viewed himself as a politician, his qualifications reflected the qualities of many politicians.

"He was a family man, he was a businessman by experience and training," Serjeantson said.

"He became involved in politics in 1991 when he was first elected as a Regional Councillor. Bill was a strong representative for the rural community and supported policies that emphasized the quality of life for the people of Halton Hills."

Serjeantson said that although Councillor Robson wasn't known for speaking often, when he did, he was always passionate and always committed to his position on an issue.

"Bill took a great deal of pride in his commitment as the Halton Region representative on the Niagara Escarpment Commission and firmly believed in the escarpment's preservation for future generations to enjoy."

Council can fill the vacant Ward 2 seat by either making an appointment or holding a by-election.



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
