Fire department gets new trailer

Kudos to the Halton Hills Insurance Brokers Association for raising \$4,000 to buy the fire department a trailer to transport fire prevention displays and equipment.

Fire Chief Bill Cunningham gratefully accepted the cheque at a recent Town Council meeting and noted that the donation "says a lot about the responsible approach the Association has to fire safety in the community."

New 9-1-1 system introduced

Halton Police yesterday (Tuesday) introduced an enhanced emergency 9-1-1 system.

According to a prepared release, the previous system was 10 years old and lacked an important safety feature, caller identification. The new system, known as "9-1-1 Public Emergency Reporting Service," allows for immediate caller (location) identification.

If a caller is incapacitated due to a medical situation or other problem and cannot convey the required information, the system displays the name and address of the caller and emergency personnel can be dispatched.

Citizens will pay for the network cost of 9-1-1 service through their telephone bills. The cost of this service to each residential or business phone line that is capable of making an outside call will be 32 cents per month. The change will translate into a reduction in property taxes of \$1.30 per household.


