Hood returns to 'referee roots'

For 21 years, retired National Hockey League referee Bruce Hood travelled so many miles through many big-league cities.

But the 59-year-old Oakville resident always held a soft spot for small towns, especially Acton.

Here, in the late 1950s, Hood was groomed for his officiating career, overseeing Junior Farmer Hockey League games at the Acton Community Centre.

Off the ice some 10 years later, Hood ran a drive-in restaurant on Hwy. 7. And his brother, Murray, ran the old Acton Billiards pool hall where Remax now sits, at the corner of Mill and Main streets.

"Acton was the first town I came to, when as teenagers, you went visiting other towns," reflected Hood in a recent interview. "I like the small town. There's more enthusiasm than in the big city."

Years ago, Hood also played intermediate hockey and refereed lacrosse in Acton. He even recalled his hitch-hiking trips after games here, particularly his first ride on the back of a motorcycle.

"When the area expands, we'll be here ahead of time to expand with it," he said, adding the Mill Street office has been refurbished, including ceiling work, carpeting, painting and a sports wall based on Hood's officiating career (highlighted with a framed picture of his calling of Bobby Orr's overtime winning goal against St. Louis in the 1969-70 Stanley Cup final).

A native of Freelton, Hood's objective is to give quality service to Actonites. He's carrying out that commitment by acquiring the most up-to-date equipment in the travel business and recently sent the retained staff of Acton Travel to a training session in Toronto.

The agency prides itself on lining up corporate business travel, along with group packages (a trip to Montreal to see the Canadiens is a favourite). They are known as "the vacation, cruise and business travel specialists," said Hood.


