Coun. Elliot in angst over arena

servicing and financing deals for the new Acton East arena, the more frustrated Acton Councillor Norm Elliot becomes.

Town Council recently bought an eight-acre site for the new facility on the north side of Hwy. 7 east of Churchill Road. But nothing more will happen until the Town finds out if it will get a provincial grant and the Acton East developers agree to share the cost of servicing their land for development.

At a recent Town Council meeting, Tom Shepard, director of recreation and parks, said the provincial funding question should be clearer following the Harris gov-

ernment's economic statement later this month. The Town had funding for the arena from a former NDP government grant program.

"If there is any good news in this, it is that I was told by ministry staff that the one program that they are reviewing is the one we applied under," Shepard said.

"What that means, or what the outcome will be, I have no idea."

Shepard said he would have another update for council following a meeting with the Acton East developers and Town and Regional staff. That prompted Councillor Norm Elliott to complain that he was frustrated with the delays and the fact there is no political involvement in the talks.

"I'm looking for some assurance from Mr. Shepard that there The longer it takes to nail down applied for \$1.3 million in capital is a plan 'B' if the answer from the province is no, we're not getting any money," Elliott said.

Town administrator Ray King assured Elliott that staff share his concerns about the arena project and said the key issue is servicing the land - putting in storm sewers, water mains and roads.

Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson commented if the Town couldn't service the arena land, she'd be willing to look for another site.

Elliott said finding a new site would be going back four or five years in the arena development process.

Effective November 6, 1995, the Assessment Branch of the Ministry of Revenue has mailed Assessment Notices to individual property owners/tenants in the Region of Halton. This Notice identifies the new assessment figure which will be used for your property effective January 1, 1996.

If you want to know how this new assessment will affect your property tax bill, you can calculate your estimated new tax amount with the following three steps:

1. Identify the new Assessed Value for your property. This is found on the Notice of Property Assessment in bold print approximately in the middle of the notice.

2. Identify the Mill Rate which applies to your property. Residential properties should use:

0.3463280 (urban areas)

0.3213932 (rural areas)

Commercial properties should use:

0.4074447 (urban areas)

0.3781132 (rural areas)

3. Multiply the Assessed Value by the Mill Rate to determine your estimated annual property tax.

Assessed Value x Mill Rate = Estimated Taxes
