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

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Seminar helps holiday grieving

Enduring the holiday season after the death of a loved one can be a difficult time.

The Bereavement Resource Centre of Halton Hills is holding a "Coping With the Holidays," seminar tomorrow (Thursday) at 7:30 pm in St. Alban's Church hall.

Mary Carpenter, co-ordinator for the three-year-old centre, will speak on ways to help get through a trying time of year.

"Our main focus is to give people some strategies on how to cope," says Carpenter.

One thing to do is make a list of all the holiday traditions you have done over the years. Decide on

your priorities. You might decide to cancel some of them or get help to keep all of the traditions in place. Carpenter says if a widow is used to having the entire family over for a big home-cooked meal, maybe a potluck dinner would be easier to accomplish this year.

When sending Christmas cards, Carpenter suggests writing one letter for all of them, especially if it's a letter informing acquaintances of the death of a family member. The important thing is to do whatever feels right.

"It's a time people seem to dread and is just as significant as an anniversary or birthday."

The centre runs group seminars for adults. The support from other

group members and hearing from people with the same experiences is very helpful, she says.

"People come in as strangers and in a lot of pain. They leave knowing they're not alone."

The centre serves all of North Halton. Although support sessions have only been held in Georgetown to date, Carpenter would like to offer them in Acton, if the interest is there. Carpenter can be reached by phone or in person on Fridays only, as the centre does not have office space of its own and uses an office at the Literacy Guild. Messages, which Carpenter tries to answer within a day, can be left on the centre's answering machine at 873-7630.
