# Eden Mills architect featured in housing exhibit

An exhibition of affordable housing projects at First Canadian Place in Toronto includes the work of Eden Mills architect Charles Simon. The Housing Futures exhibit, showing plans, photographs and models, is open Monday to Friday from 11:30 am to 2:30 pm and runs until Jan. 18.

Simon's contributions to the show range from granny flats to a 200-unit family housing village for the University of Guelph.

"The projects we are featuring serve to illustrate our philosophy that low cost does not have to mean cheap," he says.

Simon developed granny flat demonstration units for the Ministry of Housing. The fully portable

units arrive in two pieces and are connected to a house. They're designed for one or two persons to live in, with the idea of living independently while having family support nearby. If the person living in the granny flat should die, the unit can be easily removed from the property.

The idea for the flats originally came from Australia, but their popularity there didn't catch on in Canada, said Simon.

"There was some resistance to them because of undesirables living in them. I think you can protect against this," he added.

Because the federal government had no interest in owning the flats, the project only produced 12 units. Simon hopes a non-profit group will be interested enough to oversee the construction and upkeep of more granny flats in the future.

The housing exhibition features the works of 14 architectural firms. As the Ontario government recently cancelled its housing program, the show provides a timely look at non-profit housing projects and shows the variety and quality that can be achieved within lean construction budgets.

### January
