Resident builds ice rink for community

While loads of youngsters locked their eyes on the tube Christmas Day playing the latest Sega or Nintendo game, Nick Kuipery preferred his kids getting a good workout on the ice.

For the fourth year, the R & M Construction employee has built an ice rink, first beside and now across the street from his Mac-Lennan Street home.

Not only is it a self-improvement tool for his daughter Nicole's love of skating and son Michael's practice as a hockey player, but also hours of pleasure for area children and a sense of community.

"I have a passionate hatred for Nintendo games," he stated recently. "It's a mind-destroying game. The notion that it improves your hand-eye co-ordination is a crock.

"With the rink, you're outside and it's good, physical activity.

There's so much crap on TV with disgusting shows."

On most nights, the 60 by 80foot rink attracts 10 to 15 people. On a busy night, you'll see 40 skating, including 9-year-old Michael and Nicole, 10.

The young Kuiperys, decked out in their Tie Domi and Doug Gilmour Maple Leaf jerseys, often lace up the skates after school and aside from a break for dinner, will close the rink long after dark at 9 or 9:30 pm.

"There's no better practice than logging in the hours," smiles Nick.

It also doesn't hurt having the tools at your fingertips. Nick has the luxury of using an abundance of work materials to create and maintain the rink such as a hydraulic excavator, high pressure sodium lights and mercury vapour (parking) lights that pump out 800 watts of electricity, and portable generators that run every night from the back of his pickup truck.

The rink, sitting on land owned by Rockwood's Lou Hilts, is already in the works during the fall when rain water usually freezes two of the five or six inches of ice needed for frequent, safe skating.

Then it's time for Nick to bring out the hydraulic excavator along with a laser beam used to gauge when the ground is level. Then it's time to flood the surface. Since the rink has been skateable since Nov. 15, Nick floods the rink every two weeks when the temperature is well below zero.

As well, repairing holes and eliminating bubbles is part of the maintenance. Nick purchased the two-inch tubing for the nets and welded the pieces together, along with wiring in the accompanying mesh that is showing the wears of numerous slapshots.

Everyone is welcome to use the rink. Nick said Michael's hockey team has held a practice there.

"I love seeing the kids using it. It's very rewarding," offered Nick.

Happy New Year from the students at Wellington Hall.

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



