## VON helps people reach independence

Special to The Acton Tanner Pat Taillefer spent this past Christmas with her family, enjoying all the festivities, but Christmas 1994 was a very different story.

Pat had been told that her cancer had spread to the bone and she was experiencing a great deal of pain. She could not find any comfort except when sitting in her lounge chair.

She had lost her appetite and could no longer manage her household chores. Her husband was very concerned and asked their doctor for help so she could stay at home.

The Victoria Order of Nurses (VON) was asked to visit Pat to help her with her personal care, to better manage her pain, and to support Pat and her husband as they tried to understand and cope with her disease.

Pat was seen at the cancer clinic in Hamilton and received some radiation treatment. The doctors also changed and increased her medication for pain control.

The VON began to help in organizing her medication by using a dispenser called a Dosette, to help Pat keep track of her pills. She had developed a small sore as a result of sitting for so long in her lounge chair. It was treated by the nurse and healed within a month.

The nurse also helped Pat with her personal care, and provided relief and advice for her and her husband. Her family was able to and reminiscing, in addition to helping around the house.

Pat also received help from Red Cross homemakers, especially in preparing meals and household chores. Pat was able to maintain

her family at home with their invaluable help.

That first Christmas Pat was unable to join her extended family for dinner, but by spring things were improving. Pat needed less help and the visits from the nurse and homemaker were reduced.

Then, at the beginning of August, another flare-up. The nurse contacted the clinic and Pat was seen again. Her treatment changed. The nurses and homemakers increased the frequency of their visits to help Pat and her husband.

This time the radiation was really effective, and when the pain decreased, Pat became more active and independent. Nursing and homemaking help was reduced.

Pat has had a wonderful time since then, and Christmas 1995 was memorable. Pat is able to get out to family gatherings and is now pain-free.

The VON is now discharging Pat as she is completely independent. Helping people regain their independence is the main goal of VON services. And success stories like Pat's are what keeps the workers going.

The VON in Acton hold a foot care clinic every two months in the Elizabeth Street seniors' building. Individuals and families are visited by Friendly Visitors and Hospice volunteers. The Alzheimers Services program provides information, counselling and visit often and spent time talking caregiver relief. Volunteers are always needed and appreciated.
