
"People hopefully will come in for change and maybe buy some gum," Sue says.

# False idols were Golden, too

The much-anticipated Golden Report was finally released last week. It was somewhat anti-climatic since many of its recommendations had already been leaked to the press. Public debate in newspapers and on radio talk shows has been raging.

The most contentious issue is the plan to scrap regional government and replace it with a Greater Toronto Area (GTA) Council, overseeing an area from Port Hope Simcoe. I think it's a bad idea resulting in higher taxes and fewer services for small towns like ours.


Some 20 years ago, regional government was stuffed down our throats. We were promised this level of government would be more efficient and save us money in the long run. It's a familiar government theme-we're spending more money but it will cost less. Right!

There are some areas - policing, public works, etc. - where there should have been some economies of scale. These were more than eaten away by overambitious politicians and bureaucrats who embarked on a 20-year frenzy of empire building.

In Toronto, Metro Council had to have their own building, even though office vacancies levels were at record highs. Here, we have the "mistake near the lake," which started out as a "green blob" and deteriorated. The first thing any level of government will do is spend as much public money as it can to justify its existence. Why would anyone think a super GTA council will be any different?

We are already paying more because somehow we got sucked into the GTA. Our car license charges are higher than folks in Rockwood, for example. And this is only the tip of the GTA iceberg.

Many of us moved to Acton, not to escape higher taxes, but because we could see the quality of life in the city begin to deteriorate. Toronto City Council, in the '70s, began to cater to any old squeaky wheel. Somewhere along



the way, aldermen (as they were called in those days), decided delivering local services was not a high enough calling. They started to Burlington and north to Lake to dictate how you should live. Etobicoke, where I lived, passed a by-law regulating the temperature of your bathtub water. Honest!

> The City of Toronto has continued down this merry path to fiscal oblivion. How many hundreds of millions were spent on the Atari public housing complex? Remember the infamous rock moved from Muskoka to Bay and Bloor? Lately, \$300,000 was sent to plant trees in the rain forest.

> It seems if there was a cause diametrically opposed to mainstream thinking and morality, T.O. would finance it. Now Toronto is on the edge of bankruptcy and looking for help to bail them out.

> Business, no longer tolerant of usurious taxes and overbearing regulations, has voted with their feet. T.O. politicians like to say that we in the "burbs" should pay for the services we use.

> Seems to me the traffic is just as heavy westbound on the 401 as it is eastbound. Maybe T.O. owes money to Mississauga for wear and tear on its systems. Don't we already finance Toronto through provincial transfer payments?

If Halton Hills Council doesn't reject this GTA proposal, our taxes will skyrocket. If Mike Harris goes

along with this proposition, I predict he'll be a one-term wonder. The regions surrounding Toronto voted Tory; not for the schemes of an NDP-dominated Toronto city council. If we wanted that, we'd have kept Rae.

I am concerned our mayor is unable or unwilling to lead a forceful attack against the super-GTA concept. Last weekend she was reported to have some "definite" concerns about the Golden Report, but to be totally negative at this point wouldn't be fair.

Excuse me - fair to whom? Fair to the taxpayers of Acton or fair to some political process designed to make us pay for the ineptitude of Toronto politicians?



A "Muffy the mayor" attitude just won't cut it.


If you could go away, where would you go?
