Through its commercial division, Double M Enterprises Inc. also offers assistance in domestic and international trade, co-op housing management, government relations and events management.


#### Guest speaker at Knox

Joe had no way of knowing that I also cover a lot of miles in a year. I have always carried booster cables, blanket, shovel, basic first aid kit and a powerful portable light. I am amazed that so many Canadians drive off into our Canadian winter without any emergency equipment. If you break down in town, it's easy to get help. At night or in the country, help

Your reaction to Ont. government workers rejecting Harris' proposed cutbacks?




