La Rose, Pettipher and Riley Duke took care of the helpers.

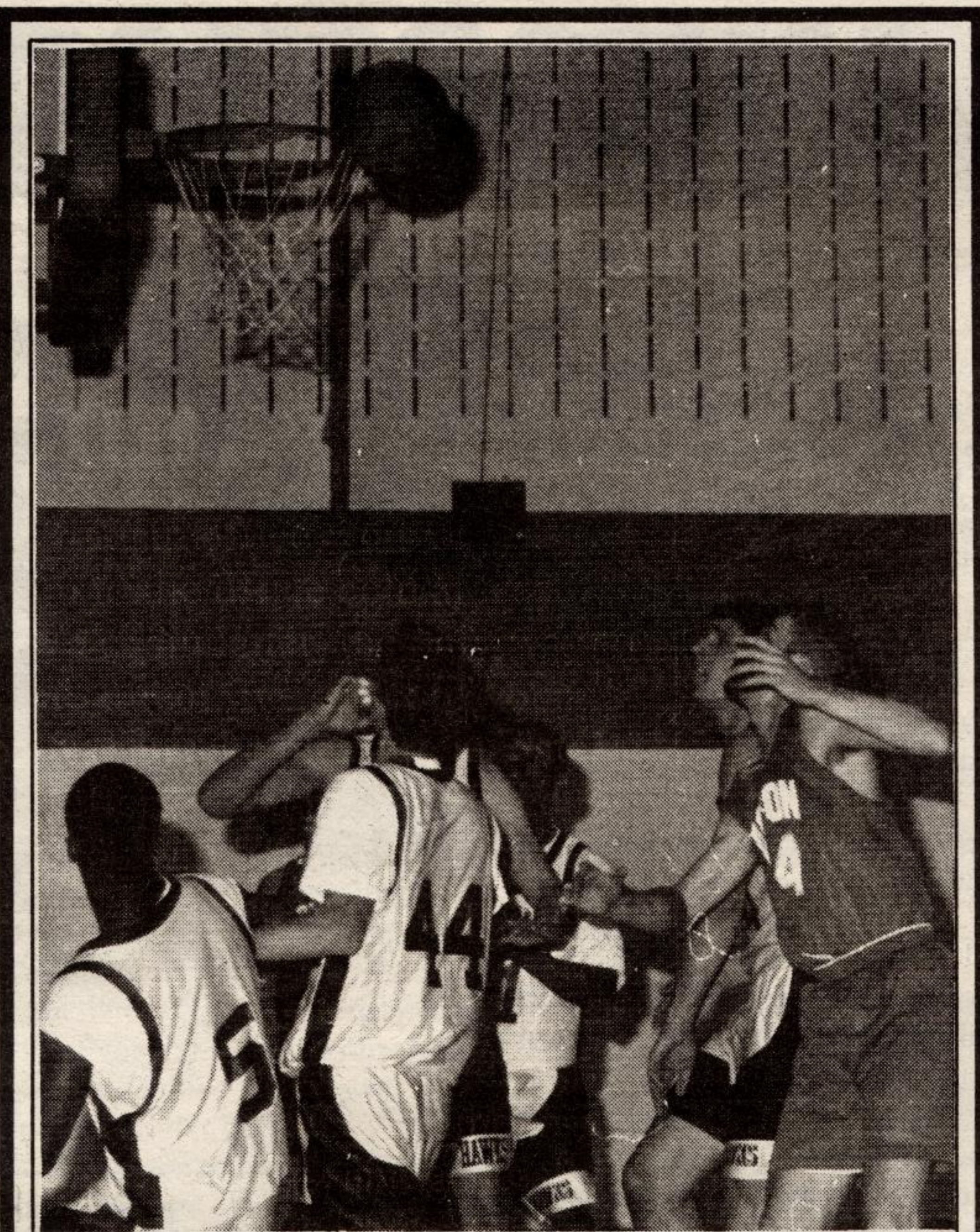

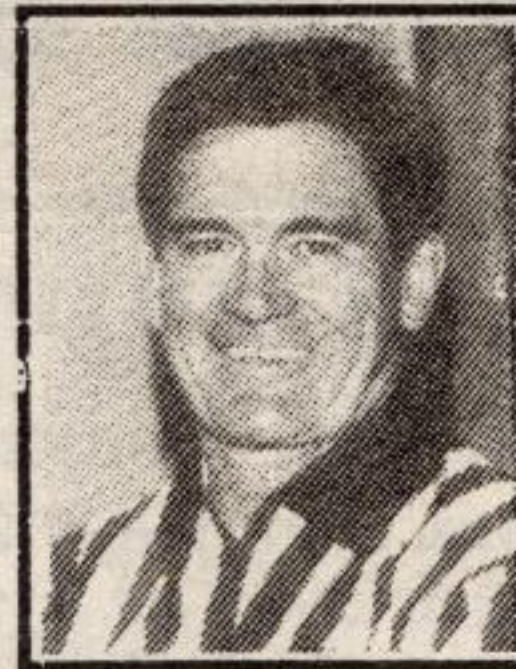
