Uncharacteristically, the locals served five balls into the net for a 15-7 loss and then drilled seven more into the mesh in Game 2 for a 15-9 setback. The Redmen played with their opponents to 7-7 in the opener before Chatham reeled off eight straight points.

Game 2 saw the Redmen fall behind 13-2, only to dwindle the margin to 13-9. But they lost serve and gave up two points for the loss.

"We just didn't serve," says a blunt Redmen coach Bob McKay, whose team went 4-4 in pool play. "That's all we didn't do. We won all the long rallies, something we didn't do against Georgetown (in the Halton high school final)."

McKay, who guided his girls to a 7-1 regular-season mark in Halton's Volpe Division, talked to his charges at length after the Chatham match to get a handle on the serving troubles, but the Redmen players were at a loss for words.

"I was at a loss why we served badly. I still am," utters a baffled McKay. "There was no reason to be nervous - we had been there (OFSAA) before (seventh-place last year in North Bay)."

McKay went on to say a few of his players didn't feel comfortable in the serving box, which was a different size because the game was played cross-court. "That didn't bother the other team, but it bothered us."

With the loss, the Redmen were Clark High in Oshawa in the quarterfinal game of the championship round on Thursday morning.

Clark, for the record, had only allowed 33 points in six pool contests the day before.

In Game 1, the Redmen played them to 10-10, went down 14-10, but rebounded to even the game on strong serves from Jenn McKay. McKay put the Redmen up 15-14 and then served another, but a tall Clark player smashed the ball to the floor on the Redmen side, but on her way down touched the net, McKay

The referee missed the call and Clark prevailed 17-16.

"His only job was to watch the net, but instead he followed the flight of the ball," says the disappointed Redmen coach. "It was an obvious call, too. That call was critical."

"They took it to us and deserved the victory," offers McKay, who adds Clark possessed five or six club players from the Scarborough Solars. "It (the club atmosphere) was a reenactment of the Georgetown match, but they weren't as good as Georgetown.

"I feel good about the tournament because we finished in the top echelon (fifth of 16 teams). We could have easily been second as fifth. Sure, we would have liked to have come home with a medal, but it's inconsequential now because we played our hearts out."


