Cinderella show at carnival

Two significant changes will mark the 32nd Acton Figure Skating Club carnival March 29 and 30: a storyline – Cinderella – which hasn't been present since The Wizard of Oz nine years ago, and the dedication of the event to former AFSC member Kevin Parker and his father, Ernie.

Kevin, 34, and star of the popular Icecapades show for eight years, passed away on Sept. 30 after a courageous fight against AIDS. His father died four months later to the day.

The last show in which Kevin starred was Cinderella.

The AFSC has invited St. Mary's skater Jamie Vollmer to be the guest skater of the carnival.

He recently competed at skating's national event in the Novice class. Vollmer,

who will play the part of Prince Charming, will also skate his short program, which Kevin choreographed.

"Their lives live on through our young skaters and Jamie," AFSC president Barb Metelka says of the Parker men. "Ernie was a friend of the Acton Figure Skating Club and longtime Acton resident. People would come from miles away to have him sharpen their skates.

"We miss him and Kevin terribly. They won't be replaced."

Carnival chair Lia Sheehan lists a pumpkin coach that Cinderella will ride to the ball and the ballroom scene as highlights of this year's event.

Of the 180 young skaters involved, each main character has a solo, so 15 of them will be incorporated with pairs skating.

"It's a refreshing change

to have a storyline," comments Sheehan. "I think people will be interested to see how the skaters portray a particular scene.

"It gives a chance to show off the talent in the club. There's new talent and others who have improved this year or developed their skating skills. It's a community event. People want to see what we have here. And we want to make it interesting for everyone, not just for the people who have skaters in the club."

Show times are 7:30 pm on the Friday and 2 pm and 7:30 pm on Saturday.

Tickets for the Carnival are available at Freezer Frenzy, CIBC and Halton Credit Union.

The cost for adults is \$7, seniors and students are \$5 each and children's tickets cost \$3.

Majority reject garbage pickup

As predicted, the majority of rural Halton Hills residents, including those in Acton, are not interested in having Halton Region pick up their garbage and recyclables, if they have to pay for the service.

Based on results of a rural survey, Town Council will tell Halton Region that it does not recommend that waste collection in the rural area or hamlets be implemented.

Of the 2,661 rural households in Halton Hills, 68.1 per cent said they did not want rural waste collection; 30 per cent were interested and 40 households had no preference.

The survey also asked rural residents how they disposed of their garbage and the majority indicated that they used the Halton Waste Management Site Container Station in Milton.

Some residents use a private waste hauler while others dispose of the waste on

their own property.

Almost one-third of respondents said they disposed of their waste through "other" means and that finding worried Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette.

"A very high per centage of people said they use other methods of disposal and that concerns me," commented Bonnette during general committee debate on the survey results on Monday night.

"Ihope that it doesn't mean that they are burning the garbage on their property and I wonder if staff knows what they are doing with it."

Treasurer Andy Koopmans said that the Town has the surveys but hasn't yet checked all of the possible options that people are using.

Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson noted that it was "extremely unusual" to get a 40 per cent rate to a survey and that it very clearly showed council exactly what the people want.
