# Bar's activities being eyed by police

Halton police and the local liquor inspector are keeping a close eye out for possible liquor law infractions at Acton's newest Mill Street bar -Bedroxx.

Information obtained by The Tanner indicates that the liquor inspector would "focus some enforcement" at Bedroxx following an inci-

dent earlier this month.

On March 7 numerous Halton police had to "stop a melee of fights" that broke out among some 300 patrons - four bus loads of students who were brought to Bedroxx for a pub night featuring cheap beer and drinks.

The report said that police were forced to clear the bar at one point to prevent further

It also notes that police have contacted the local liquor inspector who was going to focus some enforcement at Bedroxx and compile a history of any infractions.

Bedroxx owner Eugene Seminara of Mississauga, flatly and angrily denied that there was any trouble in his bar on the night in question.

"There haven't been any infractions at Bedroxx," Seminara insisted in an interview on Sunday.

"The fights happened outside the bar and were between Acton people, not any of the people we brought in from Guelph," Seminara said as he stressed that police and liquor inspectors have "no problems" with his bar.

"They (Halton Police) just never had this situation with that many people in one place in a bar in downtown Acton.

"They came in (that night)

and made sure that I had enough security and asked where all the students came from," Seminara said as he recounted that police told him they had three cruisers outside the bar for their own protection, because, "they said they didn't want to get hurt themselves because they are under-staffed."

Liquor inspector Loraine Simpson refused to comment on the situation at Bedroxx and referred all questions to Barry Tocher, Liquor Licensing Board executive director.

In an interview on Monday, Tocher said he had "no knowledge" of the bar in question but said, "we take a great interest in," allegations like the ones made concerning Bedroxx and that he would be, "looking at it very closely and talking to the police and taking appropriate action, after that."
