Casson paintings offered to council

Eramosa Township Council has first right of refusal on two rare, limited edition prints by A. J. Casson - painted by the famous Group Of Seven artist in Rockwood seven decades ago.

Council decided to look at the prints after they were offered for sale by their owner, Edward Onderisin, a Markham collector.

Onderisin said he bought the Casson prints as an investment and then grew to appreciate them for their beauty, but now must sell them because he is moving.

One print - Rockwood, 1926 – is a water colour scene looking south on Main Street, past what is now La Vieille Auberge restaurant. The second print - Saturday Afternoon-is a compilation painting of several buildings in the village.

Onderisin said he is selling half of his collection and he thought the "decent" thing to do was to offer the prints to the Township, before the general public.

"Rather than just sell them to another collector, I thought that it would be nice if people

visiting and living there could see these particular images hanging somewhere," Onderisin explained in an interview on Wednesday.

"It's a personal thing to me. I'm not just in it for the money. I want the prints to be appreciated by people that they mean something to."

Former Rockwood village trustee John Root saw the prints after being asked by Eramosa Reeve Rick Hughes to investigate the offered sale.

Root said that if he had the money, he'd buy Rockwood, 1926 for himself.

"I don't have the money, but I'd be willing to support some kind of fundraising to get enough money to buy one of the prints," Root said as he suggested the print could hang in the Eramosa Public Library.

Root said he is trying to find an independent appraiser to look at the prints, one of which Onderisin had offered at \$2,200.

The public is invited to see the prints and comment on a possible purchase on Wednesday, April 10 at 7 pm, when both prints will be on display in the Eramosa Township Council Chambers.


