Rural cluster expansion denied

Proposed plans to expand the boundary of the Bannockburn rural cluster were defeated in a 6-6 tie vote of General Committee members following a three-hour debate on Monday night.

For the 46 residents who live on the Fourth Line, north of Hwy. 7, the vote was a victory, but it may be temporary.

One Georgetown councillor was absent from the meeting and if he is at Council on Tuesday when the issue will be ratified, the outcome could change, depending on which way he votes.

Neighbours of the proposed Monckton development are worried that the new eight lots will affect the quality and quantity of their well water and change the character of the community.

One resident, Angelo Cianfarani, insists that problems he had with his well running dry and filling with sand four years ago were caused by the proponent drilling a test well 150 feet from his well.

Fourth Line resident David Craig, spoke for all of the Fourth Line residents who oppose the expansion: "My projection is that there will be excessive water use by those homes and that pollution from them will seep into the tributary of the Black Creek [that runs behind the property]."

Craig added that if Town Council approved the plan, residents would want some absolute guarantee that they would have water if their wells were to run dry.

But Town planning director Bruce MacLean said that while it was the Region's responsibility to review the water issues, no one would guarantee anyone water.

Councillor Gerald Rennie voted against the proposal, saying, "growth in the area is really almost at a standstill. To add further empty lots doesn't make a lot of sense."

Councillor Norm Elliott voted in favour of expanding the rural cluster, saying that if rural growth is to occur in hamlets and clusters, as outlined in the Town's and Region's Official Plans, then this proposal is the logical place to approve it.

Henderson is top Citizen
