Secessionist 'shocked' by tax fact

A cold, hard fact about how little Acton taxpayers contribute to the Town tax levy has taken the wind out of Clark Somerville's secession sails.

Somerville, 34, who thinks that Acton is always getting the mucky end of the stick when it comes to being part of Halton Hills, recently formed the Acton Sovereignty Association Party (A.S.A.P.), which has a mandate to remove Acton from Halton Hills.

However, Somerville was very surprised to learn in an

interview on Saturday that Acton, in fact, pays approximately 14 per cent of the total \$9.7 million that will be collected Town-wide in taxes this year.

"Is it only 14 per cent? I'm quite shocked. I can't believe that it's so low," Somerville said.

"I guess that maybe we aren't getting such a bad deal," Somerville allowed, as he noted he originally came up with the idea of seceding from Halton Hills before final approval was given to build the new Acton arena.

"The possibility that project would not be approved

was the straw that broke the camel's back. I'm still concerned that if Acton people want to talk face-to-face with somebody from the Town, they have to go to Georgetown."

Somerville said that he'd had calls from 30 or 40 people following his Letter to the Editor in *The Tanner*.

"People are stopping me on the street and saying, 'Right on,' and suggesting that I run for Town Council in next year's election. People are also telling me that maybe I have too much time on my hands as well," Somerville laughed.

"My comments struck a nerve with quite a few people. I've told them to phone their councillor or the Town to express their concerns," Somerville said as he noted that A.S.A.P. is still in the formative stages.

Somerville admits that forming A.S.A.P. was done tongue-in-cheek, but that it did what he'd hoped by igniting a sense of spirit and pride in living in Acton.

"Acton taxpayers are getting the ability to share in Town services (for their money)," he said. "Acton is getting some very specific services provided to them, [including] the fire hall and the new proposed arena."

ing and was confident their concerns about the location of the benches and penalty box, the number and size of dressing rooms and adequate storage areas will be addressed by the Town as the arena takes shape.

"Once I meet with our executive we will come back with a wish-list, including a desire for a large foyer and meeting room to handle tournaments," Strong explained in an in-

terview on Monday.

"What we want is pretty basic and I think everybody realizes those are the kinds of things that have to be done," Strong said as he noted that the Association has not yet committed to a fundraising campaign for the new facility.

Acton's John Toebes, Sr., who represented House League Hockey at the meeting, said the situation looks good to him.

"I hope we get what we want, including the complete

covering of the time-keeper's box," Toebes explained in an interview on Monday.


Toebes also suggested that the Town make the community room large enough to hold 300, not 200 people and ensure that the dressing rooms are large enough.
