Halton police will increase their visibility in Acton by altering the shifts of the two village constables.

The change in part is due to a rash of unsolved shop break and enters in the past year in the downtown core.

Although the latest police statistics indicate that the total number of criminal offenses dropped 2.2 per cent last year in Acton, along with a 2.2 per cent drop in the number of calls for service, the increase in break and enters, to 22 from six, have police puzzled.

"There is no particular pattern to the crimes," explained Halton Inspector Keith Gregory following his presentation of the year-end statistics to Halton Hills Council last week. "They cause us some concern, even though we have issued an arrest warrant for a suspect, who was out on patrol at the time of several of the crimes."

The village constables'

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shifts will be changed so the officers are in Acton more often and for longer periods of time – until 10 pm during the winter and until midnight during the summer.

The Acton crime statistics show an increase last year, to seven from zero, in the number of school break and enters where vandalism, not theft, is the apparent motive.

The statistics also show a doubling, to 11 from six, of the number of sexual assaults occurring in Acton last year.

"Most of these sexual as-

saults are historical," Gregory explained, indicating that people came forward last year to report sexual assaults that had occurred in the past.

Inspector Gregory noted that Halton's 42.2 per cent crime clearance rate is "relatively high" compared to that of neighbouring communities and slightly exceeded the police's 42 per cent clearance goal.

In Halton Hills last year there were 1,981 criminal offenses and 10,157 calls for service.

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
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vide information and to answer any questions.

# Women's group formed to help deal with isolation

A "real sense of isolation" is causing Acton women stress and puts them at risk of using negative coping mechanisms.

That's the finding of a Region-wide study of 1,000 women who determined that meeting and talking with other women is the most helpful way to deal with stress.

The desire for a sympathetic ear and a sense of "sisterhood" are what Acton women want, and to that end a new Acton Women's Asso-Reson

The group, which held its inaugural meeting last Tuesday, is designed to deal with Acton women's wish to have a network in place to connect them with other women.

ciation has been formed.

The desire for an Association was a bit of a surprise for Susan Coyne, who conducted the survey.

"Although talking with other women in similar circumstances was the number one thing that women in all of Halton thought would help them fight stress best, in Acton the women expressed a real sense of isolation and a desire to meet and talk with other women who might have the same concerns or questions," Coyne explained.

For Kelly Ann Backman who moved to Acton four years ago, there is a need for women to have an outlet, to be able to talk to someone without being judged.

"There is no place for women to get together and

relax and just be women with other women," she said.

"I meet with other moms at the Acton Parent-Child Resource Centre, but I want to meet and do things with other women who aren't necessarily mothers who have stress in their lives."

The Association will spend the first 15 minutes of each two-hour meeting getting organized and socializing, then spend 45 minutes dealing with business and the final hour dealing with activities decided on by the group.

"We also discussed setting up a child care exchange, a book club and couples club, a walking club and possibly a caring circle to deal with issues that are causing people stress," Coyne said.

Coyne, who will chair the first few meetings, said electing an Acton executive will also be one of the Association's first pieces of business.

The group meets the second Tuesday of each month at the Band Hall on Wallace Street. The next meeting is May 7 from 7:30 to 9:30 pm.
