## Henderson a humble and happy Citizen of the Year

George Henderson, the newly named Acton Citizen of the Year, said that's what helps him with his community work and his busy life.

Community involvement plays a major role in George's life – he is a Scout leader, church elder, faithful blood donor, coach, and Agricultural Society member. George is also a long-time letter carrier and secretary-treasurer of his union local.

Henderson, 48, said being chosen for the Acton Rotary Club award took him by complete surprise, but he's enjoying it.

"My kids may be a little embarrassed, but this week has been fun with a lot of phone calls, a lot of handshaking on the street," Henderson explained in an interview on Thursday.

"It's really nice that people in the community recognize you for what you've done and what you are working at.

"I was in Georgetown at a volleyball tournament this week and people there stopped to congratulate me. Since I've split my career between Acton and George-town, it's nice to get that recognition since I have special feelings for both areas."

To some, George is the smiling mailman who has trudged through Acton streets as a letter carrier for 13 years, after joining Canada Post 23 years ago in Georgetown.

George said that his job, which allows him to be home most early afternoons to be with his family and his wife, Sharon, has allowed him to take an active role in community work.

"Since I can see my kids (Mark 20, Beth, 17, Matthew, 14 and Emily, 10) after school, I don't feel so bad about going out at night to all these meetings.

"Half of this award goes to Sharon who has always kept things running smoothly," Henderson said as he joked that Sharon insists he only goes to the meetings because he's nosy.

A Cub and then a Scout while growing up, George saidhis involvement in Scouting as an adult is what "keeps me refreshed." He helped form the 3rd Acton Scout Troop 13 years ago after 13 years as a leader in Georgetown.

George has maintained his roots in farming by joining 4-H Clubs and Junior Farmers as a youth, and later the Milton Fair Board. Ten years ago he switched membership to the Acton Agricultural Society and was its president in 1992 and 1993.


And he recently joined the choir at Knox Church, where he is also a member of the Kirk Session and sits on various church committees.
