

How does it work?

(Continued from last week ...) By developing new relationships with the law-abiding people in a community, we can allow them a greater voice in setting local police priorities and involving them in efforts to improve the overall quality of life in their individual neighbourhoods.

This practice redirects the emphasis of police work from handling random calls to solving community problems.

The Community Policing philosophy is expressed in an organizational strategy that allows police agencies to put theory into practice. This requires releasing some patrol officers from the isolation of the patrol car and the incessant demands of the police radio, so that these officers can maintain direct, face-to-face contact with people in the same geographic area every day. 
