

Continued from Front Page be open to any legal action.

Young argued that the bylaw suggested might very well "stop RSI in its tracks" and save the Town a lot of money in legal bills.

"What is going on behind our backs?" Young asked, noting that 22 per cent of the 770-km Niagara Escarpment Plan Area was within the Town of Halton Hills boundaries, but 55 per cent of all of the quarries in Ontario are in Halton Hills.

"So, you have a bunch of cavities [mined-out quarries] like toothaches and the first one that gets filled will set a very strong precedent."

Although Ward 2 (including rural Acton) Councillors Rob Heaton and Kathy Gastle wanted Council to endorse the by-law, Council voted to ask its lawyer if it was possible to enact such legislation.

as he outlined how Kinsmen find solutions to problems, not just complain about them.

"Our Orangeville Club started out small and grew to a very active, successful group, which carries out community fund-raising events every year," Robinson said.

"Tell your friends about this proposed Acton charter and get them to come to the next meeting to learn all about this all-Canadian young men's service organization."

Former Orangeville Kinsmen Glenn Trendall, who moved to Acton several months ago, first floated the idea of an Acton Club and he is being helped by Acton's John Archibald, manager of the Prospect Park Arena and Community Centre, who said he wants to give back to the community and thinks the Kinsmen could raise money for the new Acton arena.

That was the sentiment of at least two other potential Kinsmen at the meeting,

Jason Ash and Scott Malcolm, both of Acton.

"I recognize that service clubs put a lot back into the community. I've lived here all my life and this may be the way for me to go," Malcolm said.

Although organizers initially looked at chartering a club for men aged 19 to 45, Robinson noted that there were some women in the audience and said Acton has the option of applying for a joint Kinsmen-Kinette charter if they want to.

That was good news to Acton's Tish Dodge who said she was discouraged the posters adverting the public meeting were aimed at men.

"If they don't have enough men to charter a club then they should look at a joint charter with women," Dodge suggested, adding after moving to Acton two years ago she wants to get more involved with the community.

Past mayoral candidate arrested

A former mayoral candidate for Halton Hills was arrested last Monday following an unprovoked attack on a Georgetown store owner.
