

# FoodShare helps Georgetown start food bank

The Acton Tanner Officials at Acton's Food-Share food bank have offered to help organizers of a proposed new food bank in

Georgetown. A lack of food and donations forced the closure of the Georgetown Love in Christ Food Bank and now Georgetown resident Colleen Brown is attempting to start another

food bank.

Founder of the Acton facility, Joan Waldie, said that although there is no way Acton could handle the demand for service in Georgetown, they will do all they can to help out in emergencies and to make sure any babies in Georgetown receive the food and formula they need.

"Georgetown is in a crisis with 250 people and 15 ba-

bies a month needing help. We have offered to help with their Board and to help them maintain credibility. Hopefully the proposed food bank will be up and running soon," Waldie explained Friday.

Although Acton Food-Share is in good shape with enough food in stock and a bank account, Waldie said she knows what it's like to have empty shelves and hungry people.

"Acton people continue to be very generous, to the point we now can offer milk vouchers that will be honoured at the IGA to people with children and vouchers for baby formula at Glenlea Drug Mart.

"Our main concern is the children and even when people say that food bank recipients bought a case of beer or

cigarettes, it's not for us to judge. But if they have children, we see that they get the

food." Waldie said their recent open house went very well with favourable comments from people who toured the facility. Some made dona-

tions of cash. "There's one dear little man who never gives his name, but comes in about every month or six weeks and drops off a one hundred dollar bill," Waldie said, noting that she gave the man a tour and said thank you for his generosity.

"The man told me not to thank him, that he could afford to make the donation and was happy do so," Waldie said.

Acton FoodShare serves approximately 120 people a month - handing out 20,000 pounds of food a month.

Waldie said one of the heartening things that has occurred is that people who had used FoodShare and are now back on their feet, have come back with donations of food and offers to help.


